

Make a... Mother's Day card

Step 1

STITCH your basket and flowers using two strands of stranded cotton for the cross stitch, one strand for the backstitch and one for the French knots.

Step 2

THREAD your needle with pink ribbon. Starting in the bottom left-hand corner of the design, two squares outside the stitching, work running stitch around the design, going over and under two squares of the aida fabric until you get back to the starting point. Tie a small bow in the ribbon ends and secure it to the aida with small stitches.

Step 3

SEW a butterfly charm to the front of the basket. Cut around the design following the aida blocks, three squares outside the ribbon. Pull away the last aida block on all sides of the design, leaving two between the frayed edge and the ribbon. Use double-sided tape to stick the aida to the front of a polka dot card.

Inside the mind of MR X STITCH

Our manbrooderer looks back over the results of his personal cross stitch challenge of 2015

Hello again dear readers, How's 2016 shaping up for you so far? I'm writing this on Christmas Eve, so I can only guess what's gone on between now and the future where you live. Hopefully they'll have cracked flying cars, and if anyone has any useful lottery numbers, drop me an email!

I thought I'd share a story about a thing I did last year. I turned 40 and in a mad panic to stay fit I decided to set a challenge to give away a free cross stitch design project every week for a year. 52 patterns, mostly new designs, and given away for free as downloads. It seemed like a healthy challenge to undertake.

within a week. Instead I went for 52 and started off with gusto in January. On the whole I think it went okay for the first half of the year, as I made new things, recycled old designs that had never seen light of day, and once I hit on the idea of trying to do flash cards -'A is for apple', that sort of thing, I muddled my way through.

One of my shortcomings from a design standpoint is that I can't draw. So I'm kinda limited in what I can do with a free hand, so my designs tend to favour typography, and things I can process using cross stitch software. So I felt a bit limited in how far I could push things, and just stuck to what I could do in reasonable time.

I was going to do a 365 challenge, and that would have killed me, so I have to salute Miranda van Rossum, 'tutor at the University of Hull, Dutch Hullensian, lifelong learner, gardener, and for the duration of 2015, mostly sticher,' who achieved the epic task of cross stitching something every day for a whole year to raise funds for five charities across Hull. I would encourage you to visit her website; 365littlestitches.wordpress.com to find out more, see all her pieces, and support her fundraising efforts.

I'm so glad I chose not to do a 365 challenge; I would have passed out

Towards the end of the year things got a little loose, and I didn't quite manage one a week, but I caught up by the year's end and hit the target. 52 free cross stitch designs out on the internet for all to enjoy! You can find yours by choosing '52 Challenge' from the Hand Embroidery menu on my site.

So what did I learn? Don't sweat the small stuff when making designs and sometimes you just have to go with an idea and trust you'll turn it into something that's not rubbish. I think I enjoyed the experience, and it felt like a good thing to have done in my 40th year on the planet!





Make a... flower

Step 1

PLACE your Brittney backing fabric face down on the table. On top of this place your stitched flower, face up. Machine stitch roughly around the flower, following the edge of the stitching, starting at the bottom and leaving one side of the stem open for stuffing.

Step 2

STUFF the flower using the blunt end of a pencil to push the stuffing into the flower head and down the stem. Put the flower back under the sewing machine foot, and then finish stitching around the edge, enclosing the stuffing.

Step 3

CUT around the flower shape using a sharp pair of scissors, 1cm ($\frac{3}{8}$ in) outside the machine stitching. Repeat for each flower.

ZIPPING ALONG

Here's an unusual idea that's very effective! Strip down zippers to make an edging for your design.



Add flair with **fastenings**

Bored of plain buttons? Making your own fastenings will finish off your projects with style – Zoë Patching's here to show you how!




DECORATIVE TOUCH
Use the Dorset button technique to make a fastening that can be used just for decoration.



SEW SIMPLE!

A classic technique for stitchers – work your favourite motif and use it to cover a plain button.



We thought we'd try something a little bit different this month and include three types of fastenings featuring mini cross stitch designs – to see just how versatile they can be. Our sweet hanging heart features a cross stitched bird taking centre stage and our feathered friend is edged with a hot pink zip. Next, try our pretty covered button, used here to fasten a notebook with a wrapped silk ribbon. Our final design includes a trio of stylised flowers with bold Dorset button flower heads.



MAKE... DORSET BUTTON FLOWERS

Use this traditional technique to make bright, bespoke buttons

Step 1



BEGIN by cutting a 2m length of stranded cotton and then knot the thread to one end of the brass ring. Now work a blanket stitch around the ring, catching the tail end of the starting thread as you go. Continue around the ring until it is fully covered in blanket stitches.

Step 2



PUSH the knotted edge of the blanket stitch inwards towards the ring centre. Pass the rest of the cotton length through the ring centre, back to the outer edge. Wind the thread over and around the ring four times to create eight evenly spaced spokes that cross in the centre of the ring.

Step 3



KEEP the spokes taut and secure the spokes in the centre by making a cross stitch. This should regroup the spokes together into clear sections, making them ready for you to start weaving the thread around them. Thread on a tapestry needle to start weaving.

Step 4



MAKE your first stitch by taking the needle forward over a single spoke. Working anticlockwise, take the needle under two spokes, and up, then take the needle forward over a single spoke, and under two spokes. Repeat to cover the spokes completely.





MAKE A... COVERED BUTTON

Stitch a small motif then use your design to create a pretty covered button.



Step 1



Step 2



TACK a circular running stitch around the motif. This should have a diameter of 3cm to allow for gathering. Leave the running stitch thread ends untied. With stitching face down, place the button in the centre of the running stitch circle.

GATHER the fabric around the button by gently pulling your running stitch threads. This will bring the fabric around the button towards the centre shank. Check the design is central on the front of the button.

MAKE A... ZIP EDGED BIRD

Upcycle colourful old zips to create a stylish edging for your stitching.



Step 1



Step 2



TAKE your zip and remove any staples or zip stoppers, and then unzip it. Now cut through the zip webbing, as shown, close to the zip teeth to create a length for your edging. Remove any fraying threads.

SECURE the zip to the design edge (these images don't have the design in them) by bringing an embroidery needle up along the stitched edge then down through the zip edge, catching a little of the zip webbing as you do so.



Step 3




SECURE the gathering threads by knotting and securing within the fabric gathers. Next, tease out any fabric puckers that you may find along the button edge by gently smoothing them with the side of a needle.

Step 4



PLACE the washer over the button shank – teeth side down – and press firmly to hold the fabric taut. Finally stitch the button to your notebook cover and use a pretty ribbon tied to the button to wrap around the book to finish.



Step 3





CONTINUE to follow around the edge of your stitched motif, making regular securing stitches to hold its shape. Trim the zip to finish the shape outline and secure the cut end with a few stitches to fix in place.

Step 4



DISGUISE the zip ends which can be a bit fluffy – simply secure a small button over the ends with a matching coloured thread. Once complete you can make your design into a pretty hanging heart using our template on page 25.

An interview with...

Eleonor Boström

Eleonor Boström is a Swedish ceramicist based in San Francisco. She tells us how her love of sewing – and dogs! – inspires her work

Interview by **Katie Allen**

Readers of *CrossStitcher* may already be fans of ceramicist and illustrator Eleonor Boström, whose quirky dog pin cushions were featured in our news pages in issue 296. Handmade from porcelain, each cheeky canine chap is created by Eleonor in her studio in sunny San Francisco and they are sure to inspire creative stitchers. Eleonor tells us about her life in making so far...

Tell us about yourself – have you always been creative?

I'm a 30-year-old Swede living in San Francisco, working as a ceramicist. I have liked drawing since I was young and as a child I wanted to be a illustrator. I think that's why I like to draw so much on my ceramics – combining the two art forms feels just right to me. I studied Ceramics and Glass at Konstfack University



College of Arts, Crafts and Design in Stockholm and then later worked as an assistant for two different ceramicists in Berlin. I started my business straight after art school, while working as an assistant.

What made you want to focus on ceramics as an art form?

My mother's friend is a ceramist and as a kid I got a glimpse of what it

could be like to work with clay by visiting her workshop. After school I started working for her a bit and I learned that working with clay was something I really liked. Clay as a material attracted me because it's so versatile and accessible.

Your pin cushions and thread holders are unique! Where and when did you first get the idea for them?

My grandmother was a seamstress and when she passed away I got all of her old spools and haberdashery. That was why I started making the pincushion dogs – I wanted to do something with her collection, not just let it all be hidden away in boxes.

Recently I made a dog sculpture that holds your keys – the idea came out of me having to look for my lost keys around the apartment. Usually my ideas come from something that I want for myself, and hopefully

someone else out there has the same need as me.

Gosh it takes a bit too long! Making the initial dog out of porcelain takes just 10 minutes. Then it has to dry for two days. After that I sandpaper and water sponge it to get a nice surface. After that it's time for bisque firing, which also takes two days. Then I glaze the dog, and the day after that I decorate it and then I fire it again for two days. Then I sew the pin cushion and glue it on. So all in all, it takes 8-10 days, but then I also have to fill the kiln with dogs and we have a big kiln in the studio. Usually I'm in production mode for two weeks.

Do you like to sew too?

It's my hobby. I love to sew in my free time, mending old clothes, sewing old 1970s patterns and remaking clothes I find at flea markets.

What do you like so much about dogs that you base a lot of your work on them? Do you own one?

I get happy every time I see a dog! They have such different happy characters and I want to portray that in my ceramics. Growing up we had two dogs, Buster and Tess, but unfortunately I have no pets at the moment. Looking at all the dogs out walking in San Francisco inspires me – there are plenty here! I really miss having my own dog though, so instead I make dogs out of porcelain!

What are your plans for your work in 2016 and beyond?

I'm not much for planning ahead too far. But I'm always on the lookout for more interesting shops to carry my stuff. In 2016 I just want to keep on working with clay, draw more and travel in the US.



Step 3

TRIM away some of the seam allowance and clip the corners before turning to the right side. Insert the cushion pad and sew up the gap with small, neat stitches.

Make a... hanging heart

Step 1

MAKE a copy of the heart template below and enlarge it by 200%. Place it on the reverse side of your stitching. Transfer the outline of the heart onto the fabric and backing, adding on a seam allowance.

Step 2

PLACE the stitched heart and the backing fabric right sides together. If you are adding a hanger to the heart, cut a length of ribbon, fold in half, then bring the cut ends together. Place the ribbon between the fabric and the backing, with the cut ends against the edge of the fabric, and the folded end between the layers.

Step 3


USE a sewing machine to stitch around the heart inside the seam allowance, leaving a small gap on one side for turning. Trim the seam allowance and turn the heart through to the right side.

Step 4

FILL the heart with toy stuffing through the gap left at the side, and then fold in the fabric and close the gap with small, neat stitches. Add a ribbon bow to the top of the heart to complete.



You'll find it helps to use graph paper to plan the position of the name and date on the sampler and the initials on the heart






Make a... patch card

Step 1

WORK all the cross stitch and backstitch in two strands of stranded cotton.

Step 2

CUT around the stitching, leaving eight blank aida squares outside the design on all sides. Fray three of these squares – remove one at a time, carefully peeling the threads away.

Step 3

MACHINE stitch the aida centrally onto the front of a blank card, stitching one square inside the frayed edge. Or, if you prefer, use double-sided tape to stick the stitching to the front of the card.

How to... stitch your doll's house design

Step 1

TAKE one of your 35.5x44cm (14x17½in) pieces of Brittney evenweave fabric and fold it both ways to find the centre. Next, stitch a row of running stitches in one strand, horizontally and vertically, crossing at the centre. You are now ready to start stitching the interior rooms of the doll's house.

Step 2


LEAVE the 1.25cm (½in) seam allowance on all sides of the fabric blank and stitch the furniture where you would like it to go in each room, using two strands for the cross stitch and one for the backstitch over two threads of fabric. There is no right and wrong position, and you may wish to swap things between rooms.

Step 3


OMIT the parts of the chart that are outlined in blue; ie. the bath, bedspread, door, doll, cake and cooker. These will all need to be stitched separately on the 63x20cm (25x8in) piece of evenweave fabric. You should allow at least 3.5cm (1½in) between each of these small parts when you are stitching them, to allow for trimming.

Step 4

FINISH stitching the rooms. Use the other 35.5x44cm (14x17½in) piece of Brittney to stitch the house front, without the door. Ensure that window boxes and dog are positioned in the top right segment of the fabric, with the bottom of the window boxes towards the horizontal centre line, so they are placed correctly when the house is folded up.

How to... make up the smaller pieces

Step 1

CUT out the stitched bedspread, leaving about 1.25cm (½in) on all sides. Turn over the unstitched fabric onto the wrong side, and then catch stitch it in place. Turn over the remaining three edges, iron, then place the bedspread in position on the bed. Catch stitch the edges of the bedspread to the background fabric, leaving the top open.

Step 2

REPEAT for the bath and the cooker, leaving the top edge open. Place the stitched door face down on a piece of Brittney fabric. Machine stitch around the edge of the door, following the stitching and leaving the bottom open. Cut away some of the seam allowance, clip the curves and then turn to the right side. Fold in the seam allowance at the bottom, and then sew up using small, neat stitches. Attach to the front of the house between the windows, down the left-hand side of the door on the hinges.

Step 3

CUT out the doll and cupcake, leaving a small seam allowance on all sides. Turn the seam allowance over onto the back of the shape. Cut felt backs, then place on the back of the stitching. Using small, neat stitches, sew the felt in place. The cupcake can be placed in the oven, and the doll will fit in the bath or bed.

How to... assemble the house

Step 1

PLACE the right side of the front and back house fabric facing, then stitch down the left and right-hand edges with a 1.25cm (½in) seam allowance. Take care that the house front is behind the bedroom when assembled.

Step 2

FOLD both pieces of roof fabric in half lengthways. Turn under the 1.25cm (½in) seam allowance on the long edges to the wrong side of the fabric and press in place. Place the roofs onto the top and bottom of the house. To make the roof slope at the corners, put a row of pins at an angle, from the point where the roof touches the house, to the fold at the top. Make sure all the angles are the same and then machine stitch in place on the wrong side of the fabric. Place the two roofs in position and then catch stitch on both sides to the house.


Step 3


ATTACH the two handles to the roof on the front of the house by folding under both cut ends on each handle. Place in position on the roof, one centrally above the door, and one centrally above the blank section to its left. Machine stitch the ends of each handle in place.

Step 4

FOLD up the house; the door should be on the front, and the handles should come together like a bag. Push in the left-hand edge of the roof to make it slope. Add Velcro dots to the layers to keep the house securely closed when carried.

TRIM off the excess seam allowance, and then turn your fish to the right side. Thread a large-eyed needle with baker's twine, then tie a knot in the end of the twine. Push the needle up through the fish, bringing it out through his nose. Stuff with toy stuffing, then turn in the seam allowance at the tail before catch stitching in place. Sew a button on the fish for an eye to finish.

Turn your stuffed fish into a key fob by creating a baker's twine loop at the top, threading it through a keyring first







Make a... padded animal


Step 1

PLACE your stitched aida fabric and felt right sides together. Using a sewing machine, stitch around the rough animal shape, leaving the bottom open for stuffing.

Step 2


TRIM away some of the seam allowance and clip the curved edges before turning to the right side. Fill your animal with toy stuffing, then fold in the bottom edge and close the gap using small, neat stitches.

Max. stitch count: 50 high x 85 wide

These designs were stitched on 14 count aida fabric.

To make a basket wrap, cut a length of cotton fabric long enough to tie around your basket. Fray the edge of your stitched aida and then sew it onto the centre front of the fabric wrap

Stitching basics

TOOLS OF THE TRADE

NEEDLES

For basic stitching you'll need a tapestry needle that has a blunt tip and large eye. Use a size 24 needle for most aidas, and a size 26 for evenweaves and linens. Use a sharp embroidery needle for finer details such as backstitch and French knots.

EMBROIDERY SCISSORS

Embroidery scissors are an absolute must-have for stitchers and can be picked up for just a few pounds. Keep yours sharp by only using them to cut threads – that way a decent pair should last you a lifetime.

STRANDED COTTON

Embroidery thread is also commonly referred to as stranded cotton. Each thread length is made up of six strands of cotton twisted together. The chart key will indicate how many strands you'll need to stitch your design with.

HOOPS AND FRAMES

Though not absolutely essential, we do recommend using an embroidery hoop or frame to keep an even stitching tension. Just make sure it's big enough to fit your entire design.

AIDA


Aida is an ideal choice for cross stitch beginners. 14 count is the most common, although it's available in a huge variety of colours and counts. Each cross stitch is worked over a single aida block, making counting and keeping your place a cinch.

EVENWEAVE

Evenweave is much simpler to work with than you might think. Start with a 25 or 28 count evenweave, such as Zweigart Lugana. Once you're confident, try your hand at a linen version.

THE CHART

START stitching from the centre of the design and your fabric. The centre of our charts are indicated by arrows at the designs' edges. To find your fabric's centre, fold it in half and into quarters.




Reading the chart

EACH square on the chart represents a single cross stitch. Fractionals are half filled squares or squares filled with two different colours.


Start stitching... on aida

Step 1



CUT a 40cm thread length, and thread your needle with two of the six strands. Knot one end and start with a waste knot (opposite). Make a diagonal half cross stitch across a single aida block.

Step 2



MAKE a second diagonal stitch to complete your first cross. Alternatively, you can work a row of half cross stitches first, then work back on yourself to complete the stitches.


Step 3



THE direction of your diagonals is up to you, just be sure all your stitches cross in the same direction. Otherwise, your design will look uneven. Continue working from the centre outward.

Start stitching... on evenweave

Step 1




INSTEAD of taking your needle diagonally across a single aida block, take your needle diagonally across two evenweave threads, creating a half cross stitch as before.

Step 2



MAKE a second diagonal stitch to complete your first cross stitch. Work each stitch individually or work a row of half cross stitches, then work back on yourself to complete the stitches.

Step 3



CONTINUE working from the centre of your design outward. If you find the extra counting a bit daunting at first, don't give up. We promise it'll become second nature in no time.

THE KEY

ALL THE symbols that appear on the chart are listed in the key with their corresponding thread codes beside them. The key also tells you the different stitches used in the design.

Colour match


IN THE key, the closest column of thread codes listed next to the chart symbols is the thread brand that's used in the design. Similar colour matches are listed alongside it. Where no close colour match can be found, you may have to use a different brand of thread for that shade.



BACKSTITCH

Use this easy stitch to give a neat outline and add details

Step 1



WORK your backstitch using a sharp needle, once you've finished the cross stitch. To secure your thread, weave it through the back of your stitches, then bring your needle up to the surface.

Step 2



WORK your backstitch over about 1-3 chart squares at a time, making sure to closely follow the chart. Any longer and your stitches could end up becoming loose and pulling out.

Step 3




FOR each additional stitch, bring your needle up 1-3 chart squares away from your previous stitch. Then pass it back through the fabric at the same point as your previous stitch.

WASTE KNOT

A simple way to get started stitching

Step 1



KNOT one end of your thread and take it down through the front of your fabric, about 2cm from your starting point. Then bring it back up to the front of your fabric to make your first stitch.

Step 2



BEGIN stitching your design, making sure you're stitching over your starting thread with each stitch. You can work whole stitches or work half stitches then come back on yourself.

Step 3



ONCE you're happy that your starting thread is secure, snip off the knot. To secure your thread when you've finished stitching, weave it through the back of your stitches as shown here.

LOOP KNOT


This easy start to your cross stitch is brilliantly neat

Step 1




IF YOU'RE working in two strands, a loop knot is the easiest and neatest method. Cut a single length of thread, twice as long as normal. Fold it in half to create a loop at one end.

Step 2



THREAD your needle with the two tail ends, just as you normally would. Bring your needle up to the front of your fabric, leaving a small loop of thread on the reverse.

Step 3




MAKE a half cross stitch, passing your needle through the loop on the reverse as shown here. Pull all the way to secure the thread. Now continue with your stitching as normal.

FRENCH KNOTS

Go dotty with this simple way to add neat knots to your designs

Step 1



USE a sharp embroidery needle to help pierce the fabric. Bring your needle up at your starting point and wrap your thread once or twice around the needle. Use one strand for a small knot and two for a slightly chunkier knot.

Step 2



HOLD your thread end firmly and take your needle down, ever so slightly over from where you came up. Slide the twisted thread down the needle, so it rests on the fabric's surface, and gently feed the needle through the fabric.

Step 3




KEEP your thread as taut as possible to prevent the knot becoming loose. Gently pull your thread through to tighten the knot, so that it sits neatly on the surface. And remember, if you don't get it right away, keep practising!

FRACTIONALS

These little stitches are great for adding a bit more detail to your work

Step 1



START with a quarter stitch, working from one corner into the centre. For evenweave, there is already a hole in the centre to stitch into. With aida, you'll need to pierce the centre of the block.

Step 2



MAKE your next quarter stitch in your second colour, coming up from the opposite corner and back down through the centre. You've now created a half cross stitch.


Step 3



FINISH your stitch by making a half cross stitch. Fractionals are shown in the chart either as two symbols opposite one another in a chart square, or by a symbol opposite an empty space.


BEADING

TO ATTACH beads, you'll need a thin, flexible beading needle. Thread with one strand of cotton. Bring your needle to the front of your design, thread on a bead and make a diagonal stitch to secure the bead. If you like, stitch through again for added security.




HALF CROSS STITCH

HALF cross stitches are exactly what they sound like – half of a cross stitch. Each diagonal stitch is worked across two evenweave threads or one aida block. They're most often used to create a subtle background in a design.



WASTE AND SOLUBLE CANVAS

WASTE and soluble canvases are used when stitching on plain fabrics and felts. Tack onto your fabric and stitch as normal. Soluble canvas dissolves in water. For waste canvas, soak in water then remove each thread individually.

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
